The negative impact of globalization


- Multinationals have exported jobs from developed countries to developing countries through foreign investments.

- The increased application of technology, especially in globally operating companies, can reduce the use of and dependence on labour.




The impacts of globalization on the labour market


- It is not easy to identify the impact of globalisation on the labour market because its movements are influenced many factors simultaneously.

- The long term effects of working capital investments have become more visible in Hungary as well.





